JS Students Nathan & Isaac Garza

Nathaniel Garza finds himself quite busy these days. It hasn't always been this way for the 8th grade Junior School student; typically shy, Nathaniel has become increasingly more confident as he discovers his love and talent for painting. Now his painting has become his outlet and he has begun to excel academically and emotionally.

The road to Nathaniel's success has not always been so smooth. After a few years of misdiagnosis, Nathaniel was diagnosed with ASD, Autism Spectrum Disorder, when he





was in the 5th grade. His family learned as much about autism thru organizations like Autism Treatment Center (ATC) and DisabilitySA and have been strong supporters for both Nathaniel and Isaac, his brother who also has autism. The Garza family recently moved into the Alamo Heights district after Nathaniel's father met a man at work who has autism. He inquired about where he'd gone to school and

the co-worker spoke with high regard about how the district helped him achieve his goals. The Garza family immediately began looking for a place to call home in the area.

Before Nathaniel found his passion for painting, he received typical services such as speech and occupational therapies. Nathaniel still has issues with maintaining eye contact and engaging in reciprocal conversation. "He tries to stay focused on the person speaking but tends to focus on his own interests," shares his mom, Valerie. Because of these difficulties, Nathaniel tends to stick close to immediate family; "big gatherings can take a toll on his energy" says his mom. Art seems to change that, however, "if it's an art event, he has no

His confidence has crossed over to his success at school. He is now in theatre and advanced art at the Junior School. His art teacher, Casey Fallis, underscores the role art can play in a person's life, "Nathaniel's

story is one that rings true for many students. The fine arts are truly a critical component of

child development." He adds, "We all want to connect, and sometimes the fine arts give us that chance to connect without the words that so often let us down." Connecting with others is precisely what Nathaniel is doing through his art. He is using his medium to bring awareness and support to autism and the organizations that have supported him; Nathaniel is running for Fiesta Especial King. His fundraising efforts towards becoming King



have opened up opportunities to be part of multiple parades, make TV appearances and take part in a commercial for Autism Treatment Center. This year, Nathaniel marched in the 41st Annual Alamo Heights Holiday parade as part of the Fiesta Especial court.

When asked what actions the family is taking to plan for Nathaniel's future, Valerie says that they encourage Nathaniel to pay for items at the store on his own and speak to spectators at his art shows to foster more confidence and independence. Valerie concludes, "Like most special needs parents, my main expectation for him is independence. To know that he will be okay and just fine on his own. And I know he will."

Like his younger brother, Isaac is also on the Autism spectrum. As the saying goes, "if you've

met one person with autism, you've met one person with autism." While Nathan is shy and prefers to stay close to family, Isaac is more social and likes to explore his surroundings. The two brothers have different strengths but they complement each other. At Nathan's art shows, Isaac engages customers with his friendliness. He helps in practical ways by bagging merchandise and counting inventory. Isaac has a strong work ethic and is disciplined at saving his money. He knows that Nathan's success is good not only for Nathan but for the family as well. The job he takes

most seriously is that of big brother. Valerie says that Isaac is quick to "come to the rescue" when Nathan becomes overwhelmed and shies from the crowd.

Valerie has been very pleased with how well both her sons have done in the transition to a new district and school. The impact that the teachers at the JS have already made on Isaac is readily apparent. "Ms. Woods has been amazing. She has seen Isaac at his lows and highs but always responds with love and concern" commends Valerie. Though Isaac has been an anxious child in the past, Valerie believes that having clear expectations has helped him thrive and that success has translated to many of his classes. "That's one reason why we love the district even more," adds Valerie. One of the areas that Isaac has excelled in is choir. "It's

something we never thought we'd see him do... perform with a group... I cried at the [combined high school and junior school] choir performance out of sheer pride and awe." Choir director, Rachel Holliday says it beautifully, "Choir is a place for Isaac to experience success, be part of a team of his peers and truly be 100% included. For Isaac and many students like him, fine arts classrooms are a place where he can excel."

When asked to consider what goals she has for Isaac this school year, Valerie says she expects that Isaac be able to maintain his composure and continue to work on having self-control. Looking further out into his future, she is confident that he will build on the daily living skills he's learning now along with the customer service skills he's honing at his brother's art exhibits. She has no doubt that he will be running the snack food truck he dreams of owning. While outwardly, the brothers may have different interests and strengths, they share a similar drive and perseverance that will serve them well.

Cory Howard joins the team at Cambridge Elementary as a new resource teacher where she provides reading resource help to 3rd and 4th graders as well as in-class



support in math and reading to a small group of 2nd graders. Cory has always known she wanted a career where she could work with children, so teaching seemed a natural choice. While working on her degree at St. Edward's University in Austin, Cory had the opportunity to do field work in a Preschool Program for Children with Disabilities (PPCD) program in Austin ISD. It was through the education program at St. Edward's that she began to work with students with diverse needs and chose to focus on special education. She considers it one of the best decisions she's made because she gets to combine her love for reading and help her students grow their own love for reading and curiosity for learning. Cory is excited to begin her teaching career in the district from which she graduated and one she calls, "one of the best districts in the state.

Corv enjoys interacting with students from both the general education and special education population and seeing the growth and progress they make from week to week. Her advice to parents on how to successfully partner with their child's teacher pivots on open communication. "Parents should feel they can openly communicate with their child's teachers/case manager," shares Cory. She further offers that understanding the ARD process is one of the best ways to advocate for one's child and adds that any questions not answered by the Notice of Procedural Safeguards put out by TEA should be directed to you child's case manager or a member of campus administration. On a personal note, Cory loves to travel and explore new cultures. She had the opportunity to live in New Zealand for a few months earlier this year as well as explore South East Asia where she worked at an elephant sanctuary. She enjoys visiting her family's home in New Mexico where she snowboards and spends time with family and friends as often as possible. Emily Melngailis

Unlike many teachers, Emily Melngailis (pronounced Meln-guy-lis) didn't start off as a teacher. She worked in Austin for the marketing department at Texas Monthly Magazine when she decided she was ready for a change. Her mother was a music teacher so the thought of teaching had always been in the back of her mind. While she was back in school, she worked as a special education paraprofessional in Eanes ISD. After a semester, she knew that special education was the area she wanted to focus on. Before coming to Alamo Heights, Emily taught a selfcontained class in Edgewood ISD for five years and was a resource/inclusion teacher at Walzem Elementary for four years. She joins the team at Woodridge as a resource teacher; she teaches reading and math in a pull-out setting as well as provides in class support in both subject. As a case manager, Emily is the primary contact for communication with parents about their child's IEP (Individualized Education Plan) and any educational concerns. She works diligently to ensure that parents understand the ARD process along with the role each committee member plays. Emily concedes

that the ARD process "Can be difficult to understand....there is so much information in these documents and meetings." Emily also coordinates with general education teachers to ensure the students are working towards successful achievement of their goals, and provides accommodations and modifications as needed. When asked what she enjoys most about her job, Emily says, "I love that I have the opportunity to work across multiple grade levels." Emily also enjoys being able to work with a variety of teachers and seeing the different teaching styles and strategies they employ. She is especially interested in how teachers incorporate technology into their classrooms.



When asked what advice she has for parents on how to better advocate for their children, Emily recommends reading the document titled "Guide to the ARD process" available on the TEA website: http:// framework.esc18.net/Documents/ ARD Guide ENG.pdf. Emily further encourages parents to ask a case manager to review the document with them if they have any questions. Emily encourages parents to feel comfortable asking questions during the meeting. "If something is unclear before, during or after the meeting, ask for clarification," she suggests. Generally, a draft of the ARD is sent home for parents to review and, if necessary, seek clarification prior to the meeting. Emily underscores the importance of collaboration, "Ask me for clarification... tell me if you see something we have missed. Open up that dialogue. You see a side of your child that we don't have an opportunity to see at home. Share that with us." This in turn can help not only at school, but teachers may be able to support you with some of the struggles your child faces at home or transfer a skill or strength from one environment to another. She wants to remind parents, "we are on your child's team and we want to help!" That collaborative spirit hasn't gone unnoticed. Woodridge principal, Gerrie

Spellmann says of Emily, "She has a knack for developing relationships with students, staff and families."

On a personal note, Emily is a native Texan. She was born in Brenham, home of Blue Bell Ice Cream and went to college at Texas State. She has lived in San Antonio since 2009. Emily and her husband, Noah, have been married for five years and have a two year old daughter, Eliana. The family has 2 rescue dogs, Watson and Marlowe. Eliana will be a Mini Mule next year. In her free time, Emily enjoys reading (she is a reading teacher!) and running to relieve stress, relax and enjoy the outdoors. She also loves to cook. The whole family enjoys taking walks, going to museums and the zoo and generally spending time together. During the summer, they love traveling to see extended family on the east coast and are considering a road trip to Montana next summer.




New Parent Liaison
